"Providing Proactive Care: Texas Christian University's Comprehensive Collaborative Care Model (CCCM)"

TCU's Comprehensive Collaborative Care Model (CCCM) can help institutions to improve their effectiveness in addressing the growing nationwide campus mental health crisis. CCCM has determined that varied, dedicated systems of care are better for students — and for staff—than traditional counseling models. TCU secured a grant from the Department of Health & Human Services to fund a crisis and triage team, staffed by therapists with no scheduled caseload. This allowed students to receive care on a walkin basis at the time of crisis, while allowing other counselors to maintain regular caseloads. In addition to counseling, TCU now offers a wide range of peer support communities, including grief, eating and body image issues, depression and anxiety, and recovery. ### Post-Pandemic Advising: Encouraging Collaboration through Organization Involvement

Many myths surround student organization involvement, and with reported post-pandemic reluctance in general, the time is ripe to dispel the myths. This presentation highlights the benefits of faculty/student and faculty/faculty collaboration within the framework of student organizations and explores creating a campus culture for student organization involvement by faculty (both adjunct and full-time) and students especially in the first 2 semesters of community college, forming partnerships among student resource departments, faculty, and students, and leveraging student organizations for advising, mentoring, and resourcing students.

The template uses an OER textbook as its principle educational resource, is CC-BY licensed, and includes support materials that allow for easy adoption by new or adjunct instructors. ### Digital Library Engagement: Making the Difference with Faculty Collaboration Christine Mook, Reference Librarian, Collin College

As colleges navigate course delivery and engagement in a world still adjusting to the pandemic, it is important to consider how educational extracurricular events would benefit from emphasizing online components. Though we are trying to shift back to a more face-to-face mode of delivery, the escalated utilization of hybrid, blended, and fully online classes probably isn't going anywhere—nor should it. In conjunction with the continued offering and enrollment of distance courses, it is also important to lean into planning educational extracurricular events (e.g. workshops, guest speakers, etc.) within some of the same parameters. Collaboration with faculty who already have an understanding of digital delivery could make all the difference.
